TWO DIE, FIVE FELL ILL IN CROWD SURGE DURING RATH YATRA CELEBRATIONS IN ODISHA'S PURI

Two persons died and five others fell ill in a temporary crowd surge and uncomfortable weather conditions during the Rath Yatra celebrations in this rain-affected Odisha town on Thursday, according to the Chief Minister's Office (CMO). During the festival, seven people felt unwell, and they were shifted to the hospital without delay, the CMO said in a statement. "Among them, one male devotee aged above 60 years unfortunately succumbed. The exact cause of death is being ascertained by the concerned authorities," it said. "Separately, in an unrelated incident, a male devotee aged above 35 years suffered a cardiac arrest and, despite immediate medical intervention, unfortunately passed away," the statement read.

Lord Jagannath, Balabhadra and Subhadra began their 9-day Rath Yatra in Puri on Thursday, with nearly 2 lakh devotees gathering despite heavy rain. The festival commenced with the sacred Pahandi ritual, during which the deities were ceremonially carried from the 12th-century Jagannath Temple to their chariots amid the sounds of gongs, conches and cymbals. Chakraraj Sudarshan was placed first on Subhadra's Darpadalan chariot before the grand procession set out towards the Gundicha Temple, about 2.6 km away.

India ask its seafarers not to take Hormuz voyages

New Delhi: New Delhi has directed shipowners, ship managers, and recruitment companies not to deploy Indian seafarers on vessels undertaking trips through the Strait of Hormuz amid renewed fighting between the United States and Iran. The move came after two Indian seafarers were killed in attacks on vessels near the strait over last three days.

100 ISRO scientists quit, Centre tightens exit rule

New Delhi: The DoS has tightened rules governing resignations and voluntary retirement of scientists working on India's flagship space programmes, following a surge in exits from the Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO). The move comes amid reports that over 100 scientists and engineers have resigned from ISRO in the recent months.

Crane collapses in Mum: 1 dead, vehicles crushed

Mumbai: A major accident was reported at the JP North Society in Mumbai's Mira Road (East) on Thursday after a large construction crane collapsed and crashed into the residential complex, damaging several parked vehicles and triggering a major rescue operation. According to preliminary information, one person died in the incident.

NEET UG 2026 RESULT ANNOUNCED

Punjab's Aryan, Haryana's Panshul top with 715 marks

The NTA has declared the NEET UG 2026 result on Thursday evening. Candidates who appeared for medical entrance examination can now download their scorecards from official website, neet.nta.nic.in.

According to the NTA, nearly 20 lakh candidates appeared for re-exam, which was held on June 21. Out of them, over 11.21 lakh candidates have qualified for admission to undergraduate medical, dental, AYUSH and allied courses. The agency said results have

leges begins as per schedule. Exam was conducted at 5,440 centres across 551 cities in India and 14 cities abroad. More than 58% of the qualified candidates are women. The NTA also said that most of the top-performing candidates are between 17 and 19 years of age.

The highest score of 715 out of 720 was jointly secured by Aryan Gupta from Punjab and Panshul Bansal from Haryana. The top 17 candidates, who scored above 705 marks, belong to Punjab, Haryana, Rajasthan, Uttar Pradesh, Maharashtra, Bihar, Tamil Nadu and Telangana.

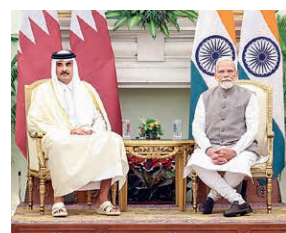

CM REVIEWS MONSOON PREPAREDNESS

Remain prepared to deal with situations arising during the monsoon season: CM

CM Bhajan Lal Sharma on Thursday directed the administration to remain fully prepared to deal with all situations arising during the monsoon season, stressing that public safety must remain the government's highest priority and that citizens should not face inconvenience under any circumstances. Chairing a review

road repair works, Sharma instructed officials not to show any laxity in carrying out essential pre-monsoon measures and to prepare a comprehensive action plan for road repairs and other restoration works after the rains. The Chief Minister directed that drains across the state be cleaned completely and ensured that none remain blocked, so that water-logging, overflow and consequent damage to roads can be prevented.

He also instructed officials to ensure the cleaning of drainage outlets on the roofs of government buildings to prevent water accumulation, avoid structural damage and help curb the spread of seasonal diseases.

Sharma said all preparations to prevent seasonal diseases should be completed well in advance. He directed authorities to ensure adequate stocks of medicines in hospitals and make necessary arrangements.

Govt doctor caught seeking bribe in lieu of foetus removal

Gynaecologist held taking ₹3.5k bribe

Anti-Corruption Bureau on Thursday arrested a government gynaecologist in Sri Ganganagar for allegedly accepting a Rs 3,500 bribe from a man for conducting a medical procedure on his pregnant wife, officials said.

The accused, Dr Mahendra Singh, a medical officer and obstetrics and gynaecology specialist posted at the Community Health Centre in Gharšana, was caught red-handed during an ACB trap operation.

According to the complaint, the doctor initially demanded Rs 4,000 to remove a foetus that had died in the womb and allegedly refused treatment unless the money was paid. After verification, the bribe was settled at Rs 3,500.

FORMER ASI SENTENCED TO 4 YEARS JAIL IN 12-YEAR-OLD BRIBERY CASE BY ACB COURT

➔ A Rajasthan Anti-Corruption Bureau court has sentenced former ASI Kaluram Kahar to four years' rigorous imprisonment in a 12-year-old bribery case. The court also imposed a fine of Rs 15,000. Kahar had allegedly demanded Rs 3,000 and a chicken for taking action and filing a chargesheet in a land dispute. He was caught red-handed by the ACB while accepting Rs 1,000 at Jahazpur police station on July 25, 2014.

Pali municipality contract worker held taking bribe

The Rajasthan Anti-Corruption Bureau (ACB) on Thursday arrested a contract worker associated with Sojat Road Municipality in Pali district for allegedly accepting a Rs 25,000 bribe to facilitate the issuance of a lease deed for ancestral land.

The accused, Parmanand Sharma, was caught red-handed during a trap laid by the ACB's Pali-II unit. According to officials, the complainant alleged Sharma demanded the money in the names of municipal officials, including the accountant, JEN and Executive Officer. The ACB verified the complaint before conducting the operation under the supervision of

DIG Narayan Togas. Officials recovered the bribe amount from Sharma's trouser pocket.

The ACB is also investigating allegations that Sharma continued performing municipal duties after retirement by getting his son appointed on contract in his place. Further investigation under the Prevention of Corruption Act is underway.

VDO held taking ₹3,500 bribe in Jodhpur district

Rajasthan Anti-Corruption Bureau (ACB) on Thursday arrested Gram Vikas Adhikari **Ram-naresh Meena** in Jodhpur district while allegedly accepting a Rs 3,500 bribe. Police said

Meena, posted at Thadiya Gram Panchayat under Chamu Panchayat Samiti, demanded the money to approve the third instalment under Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana and photograph a beneficiary's completed house. After verifying the complaint, ACB trapped and arrested him red-handed. Further investigation is underway.



AIRPORT LIFT ISSUE SHAKES PASSENGER CONFIDENCE

➔ Passenger confidence in using the lift at Jaipur Airport has taken a hit after it briefly malfunctioned a few days ago. Although the lift remained out of service only for a short period, the incident appears to have created a sense of apprehension among travellers. As a result, many passengers are now choosing to use the escalator instead of the lift.



GANDHI CAP BECOMES RARE POLITICAL SYMBOL

➔ Former and sitting legislators who gathered at the Rajasthan Assembly sparked nostalgic conversations about the once-common "Gandhi cap." Leaders wearing the Gandhi or Nehru cap have now become a rarity. Centenarian Pandit Ramkishan continues to wear the Gandhi cap, while Parsaram Mordia is also counted among the few who still maintain the tradition. Senior Congress leaders like Mordia are now seldom seen wearing the cap.

POLITICAL FEUD CROSSES INTO PERSONAL TERRITORY

➔ Two influential leaders, who are also brothers-in-law but belong to rival political parties, continue their long-running political feud. Neither misses an opportunity to attack the other whenever controversy surrounds their respective domains. The senior leader routinely counters by reviving issues from his rival's past, keeping the confrontation alive since the previous government. Though political exchanges often turn personal, the two maintain cordial public interactions, greeting each other warmly and acknowledging their family relationship whenever they meet.

TRANSFER DELAY KEEPS OFFICIALS IN PLACE

➔ The prolonged delay in the Transport Dept's transfer lists has produced an unusual outcome for many officials and employees. A large number of personnel who wished to continue at their present postings had made every possible effort to avoid transfers. Normally, they would know their fate only after the transfer lists were issued. However, with the lists still pending, all such officials and employees have effectively become "naturally retained" at their existing postings.

FORMER MINISTER BANKS ON DIVINE BLESSINGS

➔ A former Health Minister has been grappling with prolonged political uncertainty after constituency delimitation distanced him from his traditional support base. He also drifted apart from the senior leader who had mentored him throughout his early political career. Following major political upheavals, the two eventually parted ways. The former minister later aligned himself with a young political leader, but his troubles persisted. Seeking a change in fortunes, he is said to have visited Tonk to seek blessings from a young astrologer.

TWO HELD FROM FARIDABAD IN MASSIVE ₹60-CRORE ONLINE INVESTMENT FRAUD

➔ Rajasthan Police arrested two directors of Delhi-based Terrapulse Private Limited for allegedly operating an inter-state cyber investment fraud syndicate that duped investors through fake online trading and IPO schemes run via WhatsApp and Telegram. Police identified the accused as Devendra Sharma and Nikhil Luthra. Investigators said the network may have cheated victims of Rs 50-60 crore nationwide. The case originated from a Jaipur doctor's Rs 61.77 lakh complaint. Police traced fraudulent transactions to company accounts and arrested the duo in Faridabad.



Govt teacher 'strip-searches' students, suspended by dept

Rajasthan's Education Department has suspended senior teacher Saraswati Meena after allegations that she forced girl students of Classes 9 and 11 to strip during a search for a missing Rs 500 at a government school in Liwali village.

PHQ tightens norms for inspectors; deputation to JDA, RERA gets tougher

Rajasthan Police Headquarters has framed a policy governing the deputation of police inspectors to development authorities, urban local bodies and the excise department, making postings to such assignments

subject to stricter eligibility criteria. The policy has been introduced amid a large number of recommendations for deputation to departments considered lucrative, including the Jaipur Development Authority (JDA), Urban Improvement Trusts (UITs), municipal corporations, excise de-

partment, PCPNDT cell and RERA. Only inspectors meeting the eligibility conditions may apply. Applicants must have completed at least five years of service after direct recruitment and served least two years in their rank. Applications must reach ADG Personnel by July 22, 2026.

PAPER LEAK ACCUSED WITH ₹50,000 REWARD ARRESTED BY SOG

➔ SOG arrested alleged paper leak kingpin Vinod Kumar Rewar in the 2022 School Lecturer Recruitment Examination case, officials said. Vinod, carrying a Rs 50k reward, allegedly purchased solved question papers of four subjects for Rs 50 lakh and later coached a candidate for Agriculture Science exam illegally.

ALWAR BUSINESSMAN's TEEN SON SHOT DEAD; TWO FRIENDS DETAINED

➔ A 16-year-old boy was shot dead in Rajasthan's Alwar with police detaining two of his friends after the body was found near a farmhouse two days after he went missing. Police suspect a personal dispute and said investigation is underway to establish the motive behind the fatal shooting incident soon.

₹1.3-CRORE-TOURISM PLAN

Rankhar set to become eco-tourism hub

➔ Rajasthan's Rankhar, a conservation reserve in Jalore, is now poised to be developed as a new hub for conservation-based tourism. Two projects—camel cart service for eco-tourism development and establishment of Rann Interpretation Centre—have been developed for Rankhar to connect local communities with tourism, preserve natural heritage and boost tourism.

A camel cart-based eco-tourism model will be developed to integrate the camel culture with



tourism in the region. The approximately Rs 30 lakh project is targeted to be completed within a year. A capacity building and mentorship program will be launched for 10

nature guides, who will be educated on the region's biodiversity, natural resources, wildlife and local culture.

The initiative will generate employment for local

youths and increase community participation in conservation activities. The Rann Interpretation Centre will showcase the natural and cultural heritage of Rankhar.

The two-year project is estimated to cost approximately Rs 1 crore. It will showcase Rankhar's landscape, environment, biodiversity, local culture and conservation efforts through modern technology. It will serve as an important information hub for tourists, students and researchers.

These projects in Rankhar place the local community at the centre. Camel cart operations, guiding and tourism services will provide economic opportunities for villagers. This will increase local participation in conservation and strengthen the protection of natural resources.

Traders seek GST relief, civic upgrades in Jaipur

Representatives of nearly 60 trade bodies under the Jaipur Vyapar Mahasangh on Thursday urged the government to protect small businesses, submitting an 11-point memorandum to Jaipur MP Manju Sharma during the Mahasangh's annual general meeting.

Traders sought an increase in the mandatory GST registration threshold from Rs 40 lakh to Rs 75 lakh, exemption from penalties for clerical and technical errors under GST provisions, and regular awareness and training camps on tax compliance. Other demands includ-

ed installing clear public signboards, identifying alternative sites for weekly markets and expanding high-definition CCTV coverage across major commercial areas. Maternal death triggers protest at Neem Ka Thana

The death of a woman after she was referred to another medical facility following childbirth has triggered protests outside the Neem Ka Thana Hospital, with her family alleging medical negligence and demanding action against the doctors. Family members staged a sit-in outside the hospital, accusing doctors of negligence and calling for strict action. Agitated women protesters also briefly shut the hospital's main gate as a mark of protest. The demonstrators demanded a post-mortem, and compensation of Rs 1 crore.

Raj team busts sex test racket in Hry, broker held

Rajasthan’s PCPNDT team has arrested a repeat offender allegedly involved in an illegal foetus sex determination racket during an undercover operation in Dabwali, Haryana.

The accused, Rakesh Kumar, was caught under the state’s ongoing Operation ‘Akad Tod’ after allegedly demanding Rs 36,500 from a decoy pregnant woman for revealing the sex of the foetus.

Acting on intelligence gathered over the past six months, the team tracked the suspect, who allegedly brought pregnant women from Hanumangarh, Sri Ganganagar and Bikaner to Haryana for illegal tests. He was arrested after allegedly disclosing

the foetus’s sex at a private hospital. The team also seized sonography records and other documents from the hospital.

Authorities are investigating the role of the hospital and other members of the network. Officials said the racket also misled families by falsely claiming female foetuses and encouraging abortions.

ACCUSED WAS EARLIER ARRESTED IN 2019, REVIVED ILLEGAL NETWORK AFTER A GAP

Investigators said Rakesh Kumar is a habitual offender who was first arrested by the Rajasthan PCPNDT team in 2019 while allegedly operating an ultrasound centre in Sangaria. The centre was shut down following the action, and he reportedly remained inactive for some time. However, officials said he resumed illegal activities over the past two to three years, allegedly using a network of middlemen to lure pregnant women from Rajasthan to Haryana. Based on intelligence inputs over the past six months, the team launched the undercover operation that led to his arrest.

CS Srinivas highlights deregulation reforms to German professor

services through a single online platform, making the investment process faster and transparent. He said the state’s Deregulation Cell is reviewing laws, licences and permissions to promote Ease of Doing Business.

The meeting reviewed the progress of 23 priority reforms related to land, labour, utilities and approvals. Rajasthan received 30,017 applications between April and June 2026, with 17,201 approvals issued.

Weak monsoon continues in Raj; rain activity likely from July 21

Weak monsoon conditions continued across Rajasthan on Thursday, with similar weather expected for the next three to four days, according to the meteorological department.

Officials said rainfall activity is likely to increase in eastern districts from July 21, with isolated thunderstorms and showers expected in parts of Kota, Bharatpur and Jaipur divisions.

Rainfall is also likely to intensify in western and central Rajasthan from July 22-23, while Jodhpur and Bikaner divisions may witness better monsoon activity in the last week of July. Sri Ganganagar recorded 17 mm rainfall in 24 hours. Churu remained the hottest place at 40.6°C, followed by Bikaner at 40.4°C.

Submit panchayat, local body poll schedule by July 20: HC

The Rajasthan High Court on Thursday directed the State Government and the State Election Commission (SEC) to submit a detailed schedule for panchayat and urban local body elections by July 20, reiterating that the election process must be completed by July 31 in compliance with its earlier order.

Hearing an application filed by the State Government, a division bench headed by Acting Chief Justice Sanjeev Prakash Sharma sought firm timelines for every stage of the election process. The bench observed that excuses would not be accepted and asked the authorities to clearly specify the proposed polling dates.

informed the court that the commission was yet to receive the OBC Commission’s report and data related to Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes. He said the election process could begin within seven days of receiving the required information.

The court directed the OBC Commission to indicate when it would submit its report and asked the state government to specify the date for the reservation lottery. It also instructed both the government and the SEC to inform the court on July 20 about the complete election schedule.

State Election Commissioner Rajeshwar Singh and OBC Commission legal adviser Ashok Jain joined the hearing through video conferencing. The matter will be heard next on July 20.

Seven luxury buses seized for flouting safety norms in Jaipur

A statewide enforcement drive against luxury buses violating safety and transport norms began with a surprise inspection on Tonk Road in Jaipur. During the action at Taron Ki Koont, Sanganer, officials inspected 11 sleeper and luxury buses and seized seven vehicles.

Authorities imposed penalties totalling Rs 8.30 lakh for violations including blocked emergency exits, illegal modifications, unauthorised goods transport and unsafe tyres.

Officials said strict action, including suspension of permits and fitness certificates, would be initiated against violators. Passengers of seized buses were provided alternative travel arrangements.

Gehlot alleges BJP trying to disrupt Rahul Gandhi’s ‘Chhatron Ki Goonj’ drive

Former Rajasthan Chief Minister Ashok Gehlot on Thursday accused the BJP of attempting to disrupt Congress leader Rahul Gandhi’s ‘Chhatron Ki Goonj’ programme, alleging that the ruling party feared the growing support the campaign was receiving from students.

In a post on X, Gehlot claimed that the BJP had earlier pressured educational institutions to obstruct Rahul Gandhi’s interaction with students in Kota and was now making similar efforts in Uttarakhand. He said that despite a change in venue in Dehradun, students and youth were registering in large numbers for the programme. Referring

to the Kota event, Gehlot described it as a major success.

He alleged that students across the country were angry over issues such as paper leaks, examination irregularities and unemployment, and accused the BJP government of ignoring their concerns. ‘Chhatron Ki Goonj’ is the Congress’s 40-day nationwide campaign demanding reforms in the examination system and addressing student-related issues.

State Govt revises construction approval process to cut delays

The Rajasthan Government has revised the approval process for construction works to simplify procedures and ensure faster execution of projects. The Finance Department has issued

fresh guidelines, effective from July 18, 2025, replacing the earlier system to address implementation-related issues.

Under the revised process, projects receiving simultaneous administrative and financial approval from the Finance Department will continue

under the existing procedure. In cases where only in-principle approval is granted, departments will first obtain administrative sanction, prepare estimates, secure technical approval and complete tendering before seeking financial concurrence.

Work orders will be is-

sued only after approval from the Finance Department. The government will also develop a mechanism under IFMS 3.0 to digitally integrate administrative, technical and financial approvals. Officials said the move will improve transparency, and reduce delays.

A HOLISTIC OVERVIEW OF THE INDIA-UK CETA READING A LANDMARK TRADE PACT THROUGH A WIN-WIN LENS

Fourteen negotiating rounds. Three years. One London signing ceremony on 24th July 2025, and now, on 15th July 2026, the India–United Kingdom Comprehensive Economic and Trade Agreement, or CETA, finally comes into force. Numbers alone rarely tell a story worth reading, but these are worth sitting with for a moment: bilateral trade already stands around \$56 billion, and both governments are now working toward doubling that figure by 2030. Behind the smooth diplomacy lies something more interesting than a tariff schedule. It is a sincere attempt to rewire how two very different economies do business with each other.

India has signed comprehensive deals before, but never with a G7 economy of this size and complexity. For the UK, this is its most ambitious trade agreement since leaving the European Union, aka BREXIT. What distinguishes CETA from the usual run of trade announcements is its structure: thirty chapters spanning goods, services, investment, mobility, digital trade, intellectual property and government procurement, built with enough reciprocity that each side at the end of the day are happy and satisfied. Whether this reciprocity survives contact with ten years of implementation is, of course, the open question. For now, the architecture itself deserves a closer look.

THE SHAPE OF THE DEAL, IN NUMBERS

Start with what changes on day one, because that is where the deal is least ambiguous.

- Ninety-nine per cent of India's tariff lines into the UK become duty-free immediately.
- Tariffs disappear on processed foods (up to 70%), marine products

(21.5%), engineering goods and auto components (18%), leather and footwear (16%), textiles and clothing (12%), and chemicals and pharmaceuticals (8%).

- The UK government's own estimate puts annual tariff savings for its exporters at roughly £400 million at entry into force, rising to £900 million within a decade.
- Both governments have set an informal target of doubling two-way trade by 2030 from the current level.

None of these figures guarantee outcomes on their own — tariff elimination only matters if exporters actually use it, and rules-of-origin compliance is where many smaller firms historically lose the benefit before they ever claim it. Still, the scale of what has been removed is unusual and worth understanding sector by sector.

WHAT INDIA GAINS — AND GAINS IMMEDIATELY

The most striking feature of CETA, from an Indian vantage point, is how front-loaded the benefit is. Many trade deals ask the weaker negotiating partner to wait years for the real payoff. Here is a quick look at some of India's most labour-intensive export sectors that would get duty-free UK access from the very first day.

- Textiles and apparel: India is the fourth largest textile supplier to the UK. Zero duty market access from the earlier 12% comes as a genuine competitiveness lever, closing a gap that had long favoured other neighbouring countries under their own preferential arrangements. The sector is poised for immense growth, considering that out of the

UK's total textile import of \$ 26.95 billion, India exports merely \$ 1.79 billion.

- Leather and footwear: duties as steep as 16% fall away, which should bring immediate joy to manufacturers looking to scale up their British order books.
- Marine products and processed foods: with tariffs as high as 70% on processed foods and 21.5% on seafood gone, our marine products exporters can now compete on a noticeably even footing against their competing rivals.
- Gems, jewellery, plastics, chemicals and pharmaceuticals: with zero duty market access, sectors held back by varied tariff peaks can now compete on cost and craftsmanship.
- Engineering products: UK happens to be the sixth largest destination of our engineering products, grossing \$ 4.28 billion currently. With tariff eliminated now under CETA, this is expected to touch \$ 7.5 billion by 2029-30, exhibiting a robust 12-20% CAGR and will help in achieving India's overall target of \$ 300 billion in engineering goods exports by 2030.

Mobility is the quieter story, but arguably the one with a wider reach. The Double Contribution Convention, taking effect the same day as CETA, ends the practice of Indian professionals on UK assignment paying social security twice — once at home, once abroad — and stretches the exemption window from three years to five. Indian officials expect this to help more than 75,000 professionals, easing cost pressures for IT services firms, engineering consultancies and fintech companies.

WHAT UK GAINS — MOSTLY ON A LONGER CLOCK

India carries the highest average tariff of any G20 economy, and its steepest peaks have historically sat on exactly the goods UK most wants to sell. Understandably, CETA does not eliminate those peaks overnight, but it commits to dismantling them on a fixed, published timetable. A few sectors that offer exciting prospects are:

- **Scotch whisky and gin:** duties are halved immediately, from 150% to 75%, and are set to fall to 40% within ten years. Some studies project UK's exports could climb from around £250 million to £1 billion within five years, aimed at discerning target audience in India.
- **Automobiles:** tariffs north of 100% fall to 10% under a quota, phased over five to fifteen years by vehicle category. India's sub-£40,000 electric vehicle (EV) segment stays carved out, a deliberate shield for domestic manufacturers still building scale.
- **Cosmetics and medical devices:** duties as high as 22% disappear, either immediately or over a ten-year runway, opening India's premium retail shelf to British consumer brands.
- **Financial and professional services:** For UK, CETA widens access into the Indian market that many previously used to rank among the most restrictive services economies.

GUARDRAILS, NOT JUST GIVEAWAYS

What keeps CETA from reading like a one-way concession is the presence of real protections on both sides. India has, arguably, ring-fenced its steel sector while still preserving UK market access for roughly 85% of its steel exports, using a mix of country-specific quotas, residual quotas and the UK's Authorised Use Scheme. The mass-market EV segment gets similar treatment through price thresholds and quota ceilings. Perhaps the more interesting provision, though, is cumulation — the rule allowing a UK manufacturer to use Indian-origin components, or an Indian manufacturer to use UK-origin ones, without losing preferential tariff treatment on the finished good. That single clause does more to encourage genuinely shared supply chains than any tariff cut on its own.

IN-DEPTH

LEARNING ONE MORE LANGUAGE HELPS INTELLECT

The Supreme Court's refusal to stay the implementation of the three-language policy is a timely reminder that education reforms should not become casualties of political contestation. Observing that learning an additional language causes no harm, the court underscored a simple truth: multilingualism is an asset in an increasingly interconnected world. Far from threatening one's mother tongue, acquiring another language broadens intellectual horizons, improves communication skills and expands employment opportunities.

The controversy, however, is less about education than about identity and federalism. Several states fear that the policy could become a vehicle for imposing a particular language, thereby undermining India's rich linguistic diversity. Such concerns cannot be dismissed lightly, given the emotional and cultural significance attached to regional languages.

The way forward lies in balancing national objectives with regional sensitivities. The Centre must reassure states that the policy will remain flexible and that no language will be forced upon unwilling learners. Equally, political parties should avoid turning language into an electoral weapon.

EXODUS FROM ISRO MATTER OF CONCERN



Before India celebrates its next major space milestone, it must confront a less visible challenge—the growing loss of scientific talent. The reported exit of more than 100 scientists from critical programmes, including Gaganyaan, should have rung alarm bells much earlier. That the government has now tightened the rules governing resignations and exits reflects recognition of the seriousness of the problem. Yet restricting departures can only be a temporary response.

India's space programme has earned worldwide respect by delivering complex missions at relatively low cost. Such achievements rest not merely on technology but on highly skilled scientists and engineers whose expertise is acquired over years of training and experience. When they leave in significant numbers, the loss goes beyond manpower; it erodes institutional memory and delays ambitious projects.

The reasons behind the exodus deserve equal attention. Better salaries in the private space sector, opportunities abroad, limited career progression, or concerns over work-life balance may all be contributing factors. Unless these structural issues are addressed, tighter exit regulations could become a source of frustration rather than a solution. Talented professionals should remain because they see a rewarding future, not because leaving has become more difficult.

India's rapidly expanding private space ecosystem is itself a sign of success. Movement of talent between the public and private sectors is natural in a maturing industry. The challenge for the government is to create conditions that encourage scientists to stay with national missions while also fostering collaboration with private enterprises.

The answer lies in competitive compensation, transparent career advancement, greater research autonomy, and recognition of scientific excellence.
